

Oregon State Assessment Testing

The state of Oregon is required with the passage of a federal law Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) in 2015 to design and assess all students in certain subjects. Therefore, the state brought educators together to create the Oregon Statewide Assessments in the areas of English Language Arts (ELA), Math and Science. These assessments:

- help improve our understanding of how well we are teaching and supporting our students.
- Provide us with a snapshot of how our whole school system K-12 is performing in the areas of English language arts, math and science.
- helps to inform instructions and provide targeted resources and supports to our schools.
- identify learning trends and ensure all students are being served.
- used as one of many multiple measures when making decisions about opportunities for students such as Tag, advanced placement classes, math pathways.

Oregon law (ORS 329.479) permits parents/guardians and adult students, 18 years of age or older, to annually opt-out of Oregon's statewide assessments in English Language Arts (ELA) and/or Mathematics by submitting this form to the school the student attends. The school shall provide any student who is excused from a statewide ELA or mathematics assessment with supervised study time while other students are testing. The form is available at https://phes.pleasanthill.k12.or.us/resources/parent-resources Oregon State Assessment.

Students in grades 3 - 5 will be taking the English language arts and the math assessment. In addition, students in 5^{th} grade will also be assessed in science. Be watching for a message from your student's teacher as to when they will be administering the various assessments as the assessment window for our state opens March 7^{th} and closes on June 2^{nd} .

REMINDERS FROM THE OFFICE

<u>ARRIVAL TIME—7:45 a.m.:</u> Students may enter their classrooms at 7:45 a.m. Classes start promptly at 8:00 a.m.

Breakfast: Students may enter the cafeteria as early as 7:30 a.m. if they will be ordering a breakfast to eat at school. All students will be sent to class shortly before 8:00 a.m.

<u>Bus Notes</u>: We really appreciate and request that all of our families who discover their child needs alternate go home plans to please send a note with their child. If, throughout the school day their child's after school plans need to change <u>please call the school office before 1:30 p.m.</u> Bus notes are delivered to the classrooms by 1:45 p.m. daily.

On Early Release Days please call in the messages before 12:30 pm. It is important to allow as much time as possible on those days.

<u>Cell Phones and Digital Watches:</u> Students may bring cell phones, for safety reasons, and wear their watches to school. However, cell phones and watch volume needs to remain off during the day. The state of Oregon has declared that any cell phone or watch in a testing environment is a breach of testing security resulting in a test being voided. Therefore, we will be asking students to take off watches and place in their backpacks during testing sessions. So, please help us reinforce that all cell phones and watches must be turned off while at school. Misuse of cell phones or watches will result in these items being placed in the office for a parent / guardian to pick-up.
